



# 2013 BUILDING/RENOVATION PROJECT

#### **BACKGROUND**

#### **About**

Children's Hope Home is a nonprofit charitable organization registered in Germany. Our objective is to support children in Kenya who are in need. Our efforts are especially focused on Children's Hope Home in Gathiga and Ebenezer Home in Kihara, both suburbs of Nairobi. Currently there are over one hundred and fifty children who have found shelter in these orphanages. The children are between the ages of 3 and 20 and descend from very poor families or directly from the streets. Hunger, HIV, neglect, and lack of attention and love has been part of the children's lives since birth. With limited access to education their hopeless situation seems permanent.

#### History

Lucy Njoki Ndegwa, mother of four, made it her duty to help homeless orphans on the streets of Nairobi. At first she took time for the children to bring them food. In 1996, six children followed her home, and she invited them to spend the Christmas holidays with her family. After the holidays none of the children wanted to go back to living on the streets. Word spread fast, and more and more children came and found shelter in Lucy's home. Soon a clear concept and administration was required – and that is how Gathiga Children's Hope Home was born. After a few years Lucy and her family moved out of their home in order to use the property entirely for the orphans.

#### **Gathiga**

Around 15 km north of Nairobi, red dusty sand roads in the midst of banana and coffee plantations lead to Children's Hope Home. The neighboring villages Wangige and Kikuyu have tarred roads with direct connection to the capital city of Kenya. Hope Home has three dormitories, one recreation room, a cooking hut, two toilet huts, and a small office. Additionally there is a henhouse, a cow stable, a well for the water supply, and a room for storing food and other stock - unfortunately empty most of the time. Currently there are more than a hundred children living in Hope Home. They are looked after by Lucy, and two mentors. Also working at Gathiga Children's Hope Home are James, who is the watchman and responsible for security, Lucy's husband Duncan, two teachers, and a dog. The children like

to play with self made *garis*, which are cars made of plastic containers, with balls, which they plait out of different materials, or other self made games. Many children speak good English, Suaheli and one or more of the local tribal languages. The number of children in Hope Home is constantly growing, which is the reason why the home itself and also the food supply need constant growth as well. Due to the high school costs only a low number of the children can visit the official local schools. School uniforms are a rule in Kenya, which are additional costs next to the school fees and costs for learning material that have to be covered. Nevertheless almost all children would like to go to college after graduating from school and are therefore highly motivated and willing to learn.

#### Kihara

Ebenezer Home in Kihara near Nairobi deals specifically with HIV-infected children. HIV positive parents are often overwhelmed to take proper care for their infected children. It is very difficult to live with the stigma of being responsible for their child's suffering. On the other hand these families simply lack the money to get appropriate treatment and cater for their children. In addition, families affected by HIV are often excluded by their own kin and society. In many cases no relative or friend of the family is willing to take care of the remaining children, when the parents pass away. Consequently the children end up on the streets or in orphanages. Currently, Ebenezer Home takes care of around 50 children. The children are particularly disadvantaged and severely scarred. In the moment there is only one trained nurse to care for them. She is very lovable and works with great effort. Her medical and nursing skills are of big help. Ebenezer Home was established in late 2010 and currently resides on rented grounds. The orphanage specially cares for HIV-infected children and therefore has to meet certain standards and needs certain equipment, which in the moment isn't the case.

## 1. The reports subject and scope

In this report we want to provide information on our 2013 building/renovation project in Gathiga Children's Hope Home. It relates solely to the activities of Children's Hope Home e.V.. Present reporting was created by the Board of Children's Hope Home e.V. and is based on Social Reporting Standard (http://www.social-reporting-standard.de).

## [BUILDING PROECT]

#### 2. Project description

#### 2.1 Planing and goals

As previously stated the main goal is to build an orphanage with all the required facilities. Therefore we came together with our project partner in Kenya, the Tuwape Tumaini Children Foundation, and a local fundi (architect) to work out a detailed construction plan. Thus, both planning and implementation are an intercultural project.


The works will generally comprise of a one storeyed building and a capacity to accommodate an upper floor, with reinforced columns, and slabs. Together with associated external works. The construction will be of concrete foundations, reinforced concrete columns and bases and natural quarry stone foundation walls. There will be strip foundations under walls and stones in foundations and column bases under columns. The superstructure will be of natural stones in conjunction with columns, with infill of natural stones (machine dressed) used for partitioning walls above plinth. Windows will be generally standard section metal windows with glazing. The entrance doors will be metal panelled and burglar-proofed with fixed light to detail. The internal doors will be generally semi solid core flush doors. They will be either stained or painted. Finishes will be either plaster or paint on walls and concrete surfaces. Toilets/W.C.s and will have glazed ceramic tiles to specified heights, same with shower rooms. Floors will generally be in non-slip ceramic floor tiles. Ceiling will be soft-board celotex and roofs will be timber trusses. The roof covering box profile will be G.C.I. sheets [I.T.4.]

The total floor area (measured over external walls) is approximately 230 square metres.

## 4. Further planning and outlook

#### 4.1 Development potential and opportunities

To be honest, to a certain extend we share the officials opinion. We totally agree that both homes were not designed for so many children and that currently the facilities are overcrowded. Too many would share one room, they said. True that. Let's not talk about the number of kids sleeping in the same bed. Not enough washing facilities! The poor condition of the existing ones hasn't even been mentioned.

Lucy could have chosen the easy way and bribe Mr. care-a-lot state officer. But she decided to take up the big challenge of replacing the insufficient buildings. We admire her and if we succeed in this, we will create a new orphanage with enough space for the kids to gather, rest and chill, making it a better place for them to grow up. It will also enable us to cater for a greater number of children as they are coming in constantly. Beyond meeting official requirements, new facilities would also put us in a place where we would be able to ask the city of Nairobi for funding. In order to be part of the cities aid program orphanages need to meet certain standards. Achieving our building projects goals we would meet those standards and could go for some constant state funding.
